From Your President:

From Your Vice President:


As I look outside fall is upon us. The leaves are falling and soon the snow will be falling (maybe?) and it will be time to put away our beloved toys (except for those days that the burn barrel comes out and we all huddle around it for warmth while we freeze our fingers). As I contemplate that I started thinking about a winter project. Throughout our clubs history we have had multiple group building projects. They build comradery and the ensuing fun fly in the spring is always memorable.

Recently, I noticed that Old School Model Works has brought a very famous design back to life with their usual laser cutting finesse. This time the it's the "Raider" better known as the "Ugly Stik".




Ever since I got involved in RC back in the 80s it seems that no matter what club I visit there is always an Ugly Stik in attendance. Personally, I'm ashamed to admit I've never had one, but it started me thinking why are these so prevalent. Time to do a little homework.

The original Ugly Stik was the creation of Phil Kraft. Phil Kraft was born in 1926 and grew up flying free flight models. He got exposed to radio electronics as a PBY maintainer for the Navy in World War II. After the war he returned to the RC hobby winning free flight competitions, but got frustrated at losing countless airplanes and started flying radio control. Back then radio controls consisted of a transmitter supplying a "tone" (or specifically a CW tone for those nerds in the house) that activated an escapement mechanism like an old clock to give you full left, full right, or neutral while unwinding a rubber band. Phil was not impressed. In the day multichannel systems were better, but out of the reach of regular folks with their high price tags, so Phil started working [on] a simple low cost single channel receiver that everyone could afford. In 1959 he published his first design for a build it yourself radio control that was an instant hit.



Phil would go on to become one of the largest and most important radio control manufacturers on Earth at the time. However, it all started from his drawing board in his garage in Monterey Park, California. It is on the pictured table that the Ugly Stik came to life. According to Phil Kraft in the original magazine construction article: "The original concept of the Ugly Stik was to design a radio controlled aircraft which could be built in an absolute minimum of time. Its purpose was towards a flying test bed for new proportional control developments and an all around shop airplane which could be used as a loaner for visiting flyers, testing repaired equipment, and any use which required an airplane which could be considered as expendable." Phil designed and built the Ugly Stik in 3 days back in the 1960s before the advent of CA.

Kraft would go onto to introduce the first proportional radio control later in the 1960s and as the ultimate advertisement would win multiple national contests paving the way for proportional radio control to be the future of the hobby. But, what about the Ugly Stik?



The Ugly Stik represents one of the most prolifically built designs ever to be released. Versions have been introduced by many kit manufacturers. Why is it so widely built and why have all of these manufacturers produced one? It is widely viewed as a great second airplane as the semi-symmetrical flat "Hershey Bar" wing makes it a floater while still providing outstanding aerobatic capability. It was built to take abuse as a test bed and it is exceedingly tough (or at least for something made out of balsa). Inside/Outside Loops, Snap Rolls, Spins, etc. are all within this designs capabilities. This had been an exceedingly popular fun fly contender with its "go where you point it" flight characteristics.

As we move into winter maybe it's time to think about getting out the X-Acto #1 and recreating that 1960s retro design. Just how ugly is a formation of Ugly Stiks? Perhaps not so ugly at all.

SAFETY OFFICER REPORT

One important thing we need to ensure is that is while flying your aircraft, you must take a flight station so other pilots know you are in the airspace. Please do not fly from your pit area. Please announce your intentions to pilots at flight stations while taking off and landing. This includes FPV Drones. If you are flying Drones FPV, understand that your view is limited while pilots on flight stations can't see you either. With multiple pilots on flight stations, I suggest FPV flying over the tall grass along the power lines, and give right of runway to other pilots. There are times when folks team up, one flying fixed wing while a drone pilot is chasing them FPV with a video recording, awesome! Just announce your intentions. Get into the habit of flying in the same pattern as others in the air. Typically, we fly in a counter clockwise pattern over the field. Finally, preform pre-flight check lists before taking to the air. Early planning in the pit area will save a lot of body bags later ⁽³⁾
